Dean Clough

The Dean Clough site covers 22 acres, stretching over half a mile from one end to the other, consisting of 16 significant buildings. These magnificent Grade II listed Victorian mills were constructed between 1840 and 1870 by the Crossley family, who founded their Crossley Carpet empire here in 1822.

The site now thrives in a different way, as a bustling hub of arts, creativity, workspace and leisure. Since the 1980s, the visual arts have been integral to Dean Clough. Over 20 artist studios across the site house an eclectic and renowned group of artists, in addition to 6 free gallery spaces with regular new exhibitions.

Discover the site's fascinating history through the heritage trail or explore the stunning permanent art collection with the art trail - both free from D Mill reception. View the LEGO model, a spectacular replica of the Dean Clough site built from over 1 million bricks, get lost in time with The Lost Workers, an original exhibition showcasing

items once belonging to Crossley Carpets employees, or visit Chris Mould's extraordinary Iron Man statue in D Mill foyer.

Events in our festival programme include a coffee morning for past workers of Crosslev Carpets, a Dean Clough heritage tour and a special children's heritage trail.



Halifax Minster

Halifax Minster is a stunning 15th Century Grade 1 listed Parish Church, the third church on the site. It is a place of worship, prayer, civic engagement, education and culture.

The Minster is rich in history, heritage, spirituality and architecture. Marvel at its beautiful stained glass and the simple elegance of the Commonwealth Windows. Admire the craftsmanship of the ornate font cover, box pews, 'Mousey' Thompson chairs and stunning painted wooden ceiling.

The Minster is the spiritual home of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment. See the colour-standard from the Battle of Waterloo and other conflicts.

The Minster has many interesting monuments and graves, including that of Anne Lister and to those caught up in the 'Crag-Vale Coiners' story.

The Minster tower will be open at selected times over the Festival - check the website for times and to book your place.

There is live music - the Festival Organ Recital is on Thursday 5th September at 1pm. Elland Silver Band will be playing

on Saturday 14th September at 7.30pm - more details and tickets on our website.

The Minster is open daily for visitors throughout the year from 12-4pm. Our shop stocks a range of gifts and tickets for the many events hosted at the Minster.

Refreshments will be served by the Friends of the Minster on the Festival days.

The museum houses a fascinating collection of exhibits telling the story of our local industry, showing Calderdale's significance in the history of the Industrial Revolution. All Souls' Church, **Open Day**

Step into a world of architectural brilliance and historical significance at All Souls' Church, a Grade I listed building. Commissioned by local industrialist Edward Akroyd, and completed in 1859, this magnificent gothic church was designed by the world renowned architect Sir George Gilbert Scott, who considered it his best church. If you visit you'll find out why!

All Souls' exterior is a sight to behold with its many carved figures and towering spire, (236 feet). Once inside, you'll find further faces and features, all with intricately carved details. The stained glass windows of All Souls' are breathtaking and almost every window of the church is filled with stained glass, creating a vibrant display of light and colour. Designed and made by renowned companies each window is a work of art, contributing to the church's artistic significance. Visiting All Souls' offers a unique opportunity to appreciate these beautiful stained glass windows in person - their detailed designs and the way they filter the light provide a truly memorable experience.

Once the centrepiece of the model village of Akroydon, All Souls', now in the care of the **Churches Conservation Trust** stands as a symbol of Halifax's rich history.

Join our local guides for them to share their wealth of knowledge about the heritage of Halifax on one of our popular walking or bus tours.


From the astounding architecture of our Town Hall, a proud reminder of the affluence and influence of Halifax in the Victorian era, to jumping aboard our heritage Bus Tours exploring the outskirts of Halifax to discover hidden gems, significant homes, streets, and listed buildings and learn about our influential industrialists and philanthropists. We have something for everyone!

Try one of our newer tours such as the former Halifax Borough Magistrates Court and Police Station to learn the history of the site, admire its original architectural features and hear about its former and current occupants or share stories at the Royal Halifax Infirmary of benefactors over its active 127 year life as a hospital, transformed in 2001.

If you fancy a stroll outside town, how about following the route of the old Halifax Branch Canal, with our Hebble Trail tour along the old canal's length as the route climbs 100ft over 1 ½ miles alongside the Hebble Brook.

Halifax Heritage Tours CIC was set up and is run by volunteers who are passionate about the heritage of Halifax. Any funds raised are used to enable everyone to experience and appreciate the wealth of heritage in Halifax, nurturing a sense of pride in the Community.



An Extraordinary Railway Connection

Even though railways revolutionised transportation in the 19th century, the five mile Halifax branch line, opened in 1890, and linking St Paul's, King Cross, to the main railway network at Holmfield, was an extraordinary and seeming absurd project. It became known as the 'High Level' railway on account of the elevated location of its terminus at King Cross. Today the section which ran through the heavily urbanised area of West Halifax up to Pellon has all but disappeared and is now filled by urban redevelopment. However, traces of its former presence can be found where roads once crossed the line remnants of metal bridges and retaining walls in places such as Hopwood Lane, Gibbet Street, Hanson Lane, and Battinson Lane. Beyond Pellon, its former presence is more evident in such structures as the ten arch Wheatley viaduct and the 819 yard Wheatley tunnel.


Logistically, it only made sense as a facility to supply coal for the 130 mills in this elevated part of Halifax. The case for a passenger service was less sure, although the original plan was to have extensions to Huddersfield and central Halifax, no doubt encouraged by 'railway mania'. In the event, its regular use was as a shuttle service to Holmfield where passengers could change for Bradford.



Its life as a passenger service lasted a mere twenty seven years, terminating in 1917. By 1960 the line and all of its infrastructure had been completely closed to all traffic.

This Heritage event provides visitors the chance to see behind the scenes; discovering places where the general public would not normally go. It's a chance to see what it's like to stand on a stage; how the high tech sound and lighting equipment is used to enhance performances and understand

the huge amount of work and fun that goes into putting on shows and running a vibrant theatre.

A wide variety of performances and events are held in the 236-seat main auditorium and the 46 seat Bar Studio.

You'll get to experience artworks made by our artist in residence in the gallery, get a behind-the-scenes look into our artist studios, and learn about our projects that creatively reinterpret the heritage of the mill.

Everybody Arts is an innovative arts charity based in Halifax. Since 2008, Everybody Arts has been a place where the opportunity to experience the benefits of art and understand its value is available to everybody, regardless of age, ability, background, or circumstance: hence our name. Our time, space and resources are dedicated to supporting artistic development, community and imagination, and as such we are home to a thriving

creative community where everyone is welcome.

Our art school and gallery have level access and disabled toilets, but our studio floor does not currently have wheelchair access.

We're a 10 minute walk from Halifax Railway Station, and a 20 minute walk from Halifax Bus Station. The closest bus stops are on 'Shaw Hill Simmonds Lane' and 'Shaw Hill Gaukroger'. There is a large free car park nearby and disabled parking outside our entrance.

In March 2024, the 25th year of our existence, The Friends of Lister Lane Cemetery were presented with the King's Award for Volunteer Service. The green oasis that is the Cemetery has been restored so its stones can again be read while allowing for its natural aspects to thrive. We have dozens of stories to tell you about all sorts of people buried with us, from a burial in the wrong grave, to the man who printed the first Patrick Bronte volume, a man who sketched in Java, and two conductors of Piece Hall 'Sings'!

From the Crossleys to newspapermen and murder victims, Lister Lane's stones tell a wonderful story of industrialised 19th Century Halifax

Wainhouse Tower will be open in celebration of the Halifax Heritage Festival.

Wainhouse Tower is one of Calderdale's most recognizable ornate second balcony, lantern landmarks.

It was built in the 1870s by John Edward Wainhouse as an observatory-chimney to serve his dyeworks at Washer Lane and was completed in September 1875. The tower is 253 feet high, with 369 steps to the viewing balcony and weighs an estimated 9,000 imperial tonnes – it is a marvel of Victorian engineering. It was originally known as Octagon Tower on account of its eightsided design

Smoke nuisance was a persistent problem during the industrial revolution and to alleviate pollution, the tower was constructed at the top of the hill above the dyeworks to provide maximum draught and vent smoke high into the atmosphere. However, following a disagreement with his neighbour, Sir Henry Edwards of Pye Nest and persistent problems with the Inspector for Smoke Nuisance, the idea of using it as a chimney was abandoned and the flue connecting it to the dyeworks was never built. For this reason, some have referred to Wainhouse Tower as the world's tallest folly.

Did you know that above Halifax Borough Market there are two 'secret' streets? Discover them with VisitCalderdale's 'Streets in the Sky' guided tours!

On these tours you'll explore the unique architecture of the Grade II* listed Halifax Borough Market, learn about its history, visit both of the Market balcony 'Streets in the Sky,' where the houses are still used by the businesses below and some are still occupied; and get an exclusive look inside one of the uninhabited houses.

Afterwards you can shop and enjoy food and drink at the locally owned independent cafes and delis in the Market.

• The tours are best suited for adult ages and aren't really suited for children aged under 13. Children aged under 16 must be under close supervision of their guardian/parent at all times.

 Many steps are involved in gaining access to each of the Streets in the Sky and the interior of the house we visit, making this tour unsuitable for wheelchair users, those with limited mobility or children's prams or buggies.

 No dogs on this walk, please (although Assistance Dogs are welcome).

Due to the ongoing building work at Halifax Borough Market affecting both of the Streets, we're unable to confirm dates and times for the Tours this far in advance. We intend to run multiple tours throughout the Festival.

Bankfield Museum was the former home of local textile manufacturer Edward Akroyd and his wife Elizabeth and became a museum in 1887 following Edward's death. The museum is home to a range of galleries and displays, including art, local history, The Duke of Wellington's Regimental Museum and the Fashion Gallery.

Bankfield Museum will be opening up to visitors on Sunday 8th September to give visitors to the area an opportunity to step inside the grand italianate mansion and enjoy the variety of its exhibitions programme, ranging from Engineers and Chocolatiers by Kate Lycett, Wild Words: Ted Hughes and the Poetry of Calderdale, Inspired: The Art of Making Historical Fashion and of course Mr Darcy's very famous shirt from Pride and Prejudice.

Set in the picturesque surroundings of Shibden Park, Shibden Hall dates back to 1420 and offers visitors a fascinating journey through the lives of the people who lived and worked there, including the noted diarist **Anne Lister (1791-1840)**

For 500 years, from 1420 to 1926, Shibden wasa family estate providing a home and an income for those who lived there. Shibden Hall and Park still show elements of their former use. A significant number of records of the estate have survived, including accounts, wills, letters, diaries, plans and maps from the earliest days of Shibden through to present day.

A number of important families associated with Halifax have called Shibden their home. From the first identified landowner, William Oates in 1420, to its most famous resident Anne Lister, through to its last resident John Lister, who lived at the hall until it became a museum in 1934.

Today the house is a public museum giving visitors a glimpse through centuries of history reflected in its architecture and the collections on display.

Shibden Hall is an historic site and has no wheelchair/pushchair access to the upper floor. There are uneven surfaces in and around the Aisled Barn and Folk Museum. Shibden Hall sits in a steep valleved parkland and due to the nature of the terrain not all routes are fully accessible for wheelchairs.

Public toilets and baby changing facilities are located outside of the hall next to the small car park.

There is a well stocked gift shop on the ground floor where a selection of drinks and snacks are served.

Car parking is available at Shibden Park and parking charges apply. There are a number of regular buses from Halifas Bus Station that drop off opposite the park on the A58. Alternatively it is a 25 minute walk from Halifax town centre up to the hall.



A stroll through Halifax's historic and current marketplaces.

Before cars, retail parks and the internet there were markets. And in Halifax we're lucky to still have the magnificent marketplaces of The Piece Hall and the Borough Market. This walk takes you through our historic and current marketplaces starting at Halifax Minster, and winding through town to the Borough Market.

Along the way we'll visit sites of ancient street markets and textile trade, and look to the future of markets as places of entrepreneurship, local produce and social spaces.

The walk starts at Halifax Minster and lasts approximately 1 to 1.5 hours, and is about 1.5 miles.

Come prepared for hills, steps and Halifax weather.





The Piece Hall

Originally built to facilitate the trading of "pieces" of hand-woven woollen fabric, this grade I listed building in central Halifax is the world's only remaining Georgian cloth hall.





Now an award-winning contemporary leisure destination, almost three million visitors flock through its historic gates each year to marvel at its stunning architecture.

Its breath-taking 66,000sq ft courtyard is reminiscent of the great piazzas of Italy, Spain or Austria and this jewel in the region's crown remains proudly free to enter.

The 315 tiny trader's units surrounding the courtyard have been sensitively converted into more spacious stores providing homes to a treasure trove of high-quality independent shops, cafes, bars and restaurants.

In the Visitor Centre is The Piece Hall Story, an interactive display highlighting the importance of this iconic building at the heart of the global wool trade and on the top level above West Gate is The Map Room which shows where in the world this top-quality cloth produced in Calderdale ended up!

The Piece Hall hosts a packed year-round programme of world class events, including the flagship summer series of live concerts, incredible one-off spectacles, seasonal markets, art and sculpture installations, craft workshops, family fun days and community events.



'Criminal Coiners' Exhibition

Admission is £3 free for under 18s and students.

Visit the atmospheric village of Heptonstall and its friendly volunteer-led museum to get a unique insight into life in the 1700s. The current exhibition tells the story of the notorious 'Criminal Coiners' in the building that featured in the BBC TV series The Gallows Pole.

Taking inspiration from Benjamin Myers' book and a series of community workshops, 'Criminal Coiners' includes coining artefacts, a replica loom and other props, costumes, a soundscape and a haunting 'Stag Man'. Continue your exploration in the church yard nearby, where you will find 'King' David Hartley's grave overlooked by a mysterious ruined church. The museum building dates back to 1600 and over the centuries it has been a warehouse, a grammar school and a bank. It became a museum in 1972 and was taken over by the community in 2023.

Heptonstall is a historic hilltop village with a narrow, steep cobbled main street and restricted access. The museum has step access and is not fully accessible at present. Well behaved dogs are welcome, although they may wish to look out for the resident cat! The village is served by a regular bus from Hebden Bridge and more adventurous visitors can hike up the Buttress, taking in beautiful views of the landscape.

Parking is restricted in the centre of the village – there is a small free car park on

On closure of the chapel, Councillor Leslie Godfrey persuaded the council to buy the chapel and convert it into a community centre, opening in 1979.

After lockdown, the council decided that the centre was surplus to requirements.

Following a public campaign the council offered the building for community asset transfer; 22 months later the trustees of the new charity - Foundry Street Community Centre - took over the building.

Join us for a walk around Albert Moody and Albert Rinder's 1983 classic town trail.

We've added an extra stop at the historic market where we'll meet the traders, and see a version of the Royal Market Charter.

The walk starts at Project Colt on the historic Elland Bridge, and is led by their Ramblers Association walk leaders. The market was first mentioned in the Royal Charter of 1317, but it's probably even older than that. John de Eland was granted the Charter by King Edward II, which allowed him to hold a weekly market. And it's still being held, every Friday.

The market may have moved around in the intervening years, traders may now have cars instead of packhorses, and use mobile phones and computers rather than quills and ink but they're still providing a personal, age-old service.



And you can pick up produce that our medieval Elland ancestors would recognise like; candles, cheese, pies, fish, biscuits, butter and bread, and others that they wouldn't.

John de Eland was granted a charter in 1317, conferring the right to hold a market and two annual fairs, Elland became the first town in the area with this privilege.

Elland still has a weeky market but not at the oringal cross which was located near St Marys church but at the opposite end o town which has been regenerated under the Elland Future High Street Fund.

In 2017 Elland celebrated its 700th Anniversary and the Elland Town Board produced a guided walk of Elland with places of historic interest to visit. These included Church of St Mary the Virgin, The Rex Cinema, Dobsons Sweet Factory and the Fleece Inn at Elland.

Christ Church Sowerby Bridge - routes through time

Christ Church Sowerby Bridge welcomes you to step back almost 500 years. Travel through time from its riverside origins in 1526, through the bustle and noise of the Industrial Revolution, to its position today, at the centre of the town.

Starting in the Grade II listed church and graveyard, discover the stories of foundry and textile mill owners who built the church from their wealth. Why did they decide to build this church with its unusual horseshoe balcony? How did they answer the questions set by the Factories Commission when interviewed about their workforce? Discover the different lives of rich and poor, written in stained glass or stone, and why the graveyard was closed by order of Queen Victoria. Then follow our digital "History Route" to explore the richness of the wider Sowerby Bridge conservation area and sites where fortunes were made and lost, as technologies changed and industries declined.

We are also proud to play our part in the Rushbearing Festival each year, and receive fresh rushes cut from the fields to mark the changing of the season. Throughout Saturday 7th we will be hosting a craft fair by local makers and bakers. We invite everyone to join us for the presentation of rushes at Christ Church on Saturday around 2.45, depending on the progress of the cart.

A Grade 1 listed building open during Heritage Open Days.

A Grade I listed Georgian church familiarly known as Sowerby St Peter's. The principle features have remained unchanged from the time of its construction in 1766.

The plasterwork in the church has been quoted as being 'unmatchable elsewhere in the county' and more recently as 'one of the most elegant...in the North of England', yet this



handsome building is little known outside its parish. The plasterwork is attributed to Giuseppe Cortes who was also responsible for the plasterwork in Somerset House, Halifax.

The interior church scene in Gentleman Jack episode two was filmed at St Peter's

Take this opportunity to look at the war memorials from the Crimean War to present day.

The local Woolly Arts club will display their work including heritage of textiles.

Listen to organ music during the open periods. The organists are local, and it is hoped to show case some of the younger organists from the region.



Annual Remembrance Service

Every year the Friends of Sowerby Bridge Railway Station hold a Remembrance Service to remember the men of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company who gave their lives for our Country in the First World War.

The event is held in the Memorial Garden at Sowerby Bridge Railway Station assuming the weather is clement or if required under the canopy on Platform 2 (the Leeds bound platform).

The Service is usually attended by local dignitaries including representatives of the Rotary Club, a Deputy Local Lord Lieutenant of West Yorkshire, a holder of the British Empire Medal along with members of the Friends of Sowerby Bridge Railway Station who all lay wreathes during the service. The service includes hymns, prayers, a reading of the roll of honour of those men who sadly lost their lives and the two-minute silence is marked by the blowing of an original Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Whistle which we believe is poignant as it is probably the last sound the men would have heard before departing for the front.

The service is well received by the local population and is open to everybody and anybody is welcome to lay a wreath as well as the official dignitaries.

The service in the past has attracted the attention of the local media.
